CITY HALL - CITY OF LODI  
WEDNESDAY JUNE 25, 1947

Pursuant to the adjournment taken from its regular meeting of June 13, 1947, the City Council of the City of Lodi met at 3:00 P.M. of Wednesday, June 25, 1947, Councilmen Haskell, Lytle, Riggs and Rinn present, Councilman Tolliver absent.

The minutes of the regular meeting held June 13th were read, approved as read and so endorsed by the Mayor.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:-

VARIANCE OF R.A. WIESSNER GRANTED	Proof of proper publication of notice of a public hearing to be held at this time and place was had by affidavit and the Council called for objections to the granting of a variance to R.A. Wiessner owner of Lot 3 Rohama Tract to allow the construction of an accessory garage building at a distance of 25 feet from the front lot line. No persons appearing to protest and no written objections having been filed, it was moved, seconded and carried that this variance be granted.
BIDS ON LIQUID WASTE WORKS OPENED	This being also the time and place set for the opening of sealed proposals for the construction of "Liquid Waste Disposal Works," proper publication of notice was proven and bids received opened and declared--viz:- Downer Company, Inc. \$57,000.00 Claude C. Wood Co. \$49,808.00 Award deferred to July 2nd and low bid referred to City Engineer for report.
POLICE PISTOL RANGE	On motion of Councilman Riggs, Lytle second, the proposed police pistol practice range was ordered constructed with concrete wall backing at an estimated cost of \$500.00 the same to be located on the North side near the east end of Lodi Stadium.
INTERIM WASTE DISPOSAL CONTRACTS	Contract forms for disposal of liquid wastes from the plants of Foster & Wood Canning Company and Filbin Frozen Foods covering the 1947 season as prepared by City Engineer Henning were approved on motion of Councilman Haskell, Riggs second, and the City Clerk directed to present them to these parties for execution.
TREE PRUNING DISCONTINUED	Supt. of Streets Bruner was directed to discontinue the present street tree pruning program pending investigation of the City's authority to order sidewalk repairs and charge the cost to abutting properties.
TERMITES	The proposal of Rodgers Termite Control for treating Fire House No. 2 for termite infestation at a cost of \$350.00 was accepted.
APPLICATIONS FOR CHAP. 20 STATE MONIES DIRECTED	Applications for allocations of State moneys as provided in Chapter 20, Statutes of 1946 for construction of the following projects was approved by the adoption of appropriate resolutions, viz: Resolution No. 1341--Main Line Waste Disposal Sewer Line, introduced by Councilman Haskell, Riggs second for \$68,703.97; Resolution No. 1342--Sacramento Street Waste Drain introduced by Councilman Riggs, Haskell second, amount \$14,528.41; Resolution No. 1343--Construction of Liquid Waste Disposal Works, introduced by Councilman Lytle, Riggs second.

BECKER  
PATROLMAN

On recommendation of Chief of Police Fore, Leonard Becker, probationary police patrolman, whose probationary period ended May 7, 1947 was confirmed as a permanent employee with an increase in salary to \$220.00 effective June 1, 1947.

BASEMENT  
FLOORING

Proposals for flooring basement offices to be occupied by the Police Department were referred to the Engineering Department with direction that prices be obtained on asphalt tile and submitted with recommendation.

AIRPORT  
RENTAL

Brix & Dolan, lessees of Lodi Municipal Airport, discussed rentals with the Council, stating that \$1500.00 per year was all that they could afford to pay, also that they were negotiating with the two property owners, J. Louis Ferrin and George W. Emde, owners of a major part of the field, for a reduction from the \$25.00 per acre these owners had offered. It was directed that the Council meet on call of Mayor Rinn before the July 1st deadline set by War Assets Corporation if any tangible settlement of the rental problem seemed possible.

ELECTION  
INCREASE  
TAX RATE

The City Clerk was directed to immediately investigate and confer with City Attorney West as to the feasibility of holding a special election submitting to the electors the proposal that the 1947-48 tax rate be increased to take care in part of the City's post war building program.


SALARIES &
