

City Hall, Lodi, Cal., April 26, 1920.

Pursuant to adjournment of April 19th the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi convened at 8 o'clock p.m., there being present Trustees Montgomery, Hale, Rich and Hickok. Trustee Crose absent.

Minutes of the meeting of April 19th were read and approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 105.

In the matter of the Application of PACIFIC FRUIT EXCHANGE, INCORPORATED, a corporation, for a spur track.

Resolution Passing Ordinance to Print.

PACIFIC FRUIT EXCHANGE, INCORPORATED, a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California, and having its office and principal place of business in the city of Sacramento, County of Sacramento, State of California, and transacting business in the City of Lodi, County of San Joaquin, State of California, having, on the 19th day of April, 1920, filed its petition with this, the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, County of San Joaquin, State of California, praying for an Ordinance granting to it, its successors and assigns, the right, privilege and permission to construct, lay down, and maintain, a railroad track of standard gauge, and to pass with, and operate, with locomotives and cars, propelled by steam, electricity, or other lawful motive power, over, along, upon and across, certain streets, portions of streets, and other places in the City of Lodi, County of San Joaquin, State of California, and on the 19th day of April, 1920, the said PACIFIC FRUIT EXCHANGE, INCORPORATED, a corporation, presented to, and there was filed with, this, the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, an ordinance in accordance with the prayer of its said petition, and more than Five (5) days having elapsed and passed since the introduction and filing of the aforesaid Ordinance with this, the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, and the said Ordinance, which is No. 113, having been duly considered at this meeting of the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, and it appearing to the satisfaction of this Board of Trustees that the said PACIFIC FRUIT EXCHANGE, INCORPORATED, a corporation, is entitled to have the said Ordinance granted, and that the said is just, proper and legal;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the aforesaid Ordinance No. 113 be, and the same hereby is, Ordered to be published once in The Northern San Joaquin County News, a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published semi-weekly, in the City of Lodi, County of San Joaquin, State of California, and that said Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days from and after the completion of said publication, and be signed and approved by the President of this, the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, who is the executive of said City of Lodi.

Upon motion of Trustee Hale, seconded by Trustee Rich, the foregoing resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes: Trustees Hale, Rich, Hickok, and Montgomery.

Noes: None.

Absent: Trustee Crose.

Eight applications for building permits were read, granted and ordered filed.

The matter of the Land Army's occupancy of the City Park having been continued from April 19th to this date, a large delegation of citizens objecting to the Land Army remaining further in that location were present. W. A. Young, W. J. Robinson, Mrs. J. B. Waugh and others voiced their objections and City Attorney Steele pointed out the law governing the matter. After further discussion by the Board members President of the Board Montgomery announced that no further action in the matter was necessary and the action of the Board already taken would have to stand.

Upon motion of Trustee Rich, seconded by Trustee Hale, Chairman of the Street Committee Hickok was authorized to ascertain the number of speed limits signs necessary to comply with the law and also the cost of the same.

John Bauer, Director of the Tokay City Band, offered to render during the coming summer twelve open air concerts in the City Park for \$800. The matter was laid over for one week.

The City Engineer was authorized to prepare the City Plat Book on tracing paper and to hereafter provide printed copies of the same for use of the City Assessor.

Upon motion of Trustee Hickok, seconded by Trustee Rich, the Board authorized the employment of George W. LeMoin as deputy assessor, his compensation to be \$4.00 per day.

No further business appearing the Board adjourned until the next regular meeting, May 3rd, 1920.
