

Municipal Building, Lodi, California, Apr. 21, 1913.

In regular session of the Board of Trustees of the City of Lodi, the following trustees being present: C.A. Black, J.M. Blodgett, F.O. Hale, G.E. Lawrence and C.A. Rich. President Lawrence presiding.

The minutes of the meeting of Apr. 14, 1913, were read and approved.

The following applications for building permits were read and granted:

The Friedburger Estate, a new floor at 14 N. Main Street;
H.M. Stanley, a woodshed on lot 4 block 34;
A.E. Thew, a dwelling on block 15, Farnhart Tract;
S.H. Zimmerman, dwelling on lot 5 block 4.

The report of Treasurer for quarter was read and filed.

A letter from Payton Relief Committee to Mayor Lawrence, thanking the people of Lodi for their generous assistance, was read and filed.

A communication from Woman's Improvement Club, asking for the opening of Lee and Pleasant Avenues was read and referred to Street Committee.

The matter of insurance was taken up and referred to Public Utilities Committee.

Chairman Rich of the committee to which was referred the application of Elliot E. Meyers reported that he had investigated the matter and that Meyers would store the gasoline in a shed at the rear of the lot on construct a corrugated iron shed for storing it. That he could see no objections to granting the permit, but that further time should be granted so that the other members of the committee might also investigate. Request for further time granted.

Chairman Blodgett of the Public Utilities Committee reported that the Committee was in favor of granting the request of Western States Gas & Electric Company for the purchase of seven poles. On motion, the report of the Committee was accepted and the President of the Board authorized to sign a receipt for the money, the motion being carried by the affirmative votes of Trustees Black, Blodgett, Hale and Lawrence, Trustee Rich voting no.

Committee of the Whole reported that it was not in favor of leasing the city lot at the corner of Sacramento and Lodi Ave. for any specified length of time. On motion, the report of the Committee was adopted.

The matter of making improvements in the water plant with a view to securing more water was referred to Committee of the Whole.

Marshal Coleman reported that he had gone to Sacramento and examined the discarded steel cages, and that it would not be practical for the city to purchase them. The matter of fixing the transformer house so as to be used partly as a jail was referred to Marshal Coleman, Superintendent Henning and the Building Committee.


Superintendent Henning reported that he would like to purchase 4 poles from Western States Gas & El. Co., two of said poles being located on Main Street and two in the alley between Main and Stockton, Locust and Elm Streets. Referred to President Lawrence to take up with the company.

On motion, of Rich, Superintendent Henning was authorized to purchase 8 Corey Hydrants, such number as might be specified by the Street Superintendent to be provided with crane attachment.

Claims against the city amounting to the sum of \$388.38, having been approved by the Finance Committee, were allowed paid.

On motion, the Board adjourned until Apr. 28, 1913, at the usual hour and place.
