SUBJECT: PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE PUBLIC INPUT REGARDING MOTORIZED/POWER BOATING ON LODI LAKE

PREPARED BY: City Manager

RECOMMENDED ACTION: That the City Council conduct a public hearing to receive public input regarding motorized/power boating on Lodi Lake and take action as deemed appropriate.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: At its regular meeting of June 3, 1987, the City Council set this meeting as the date, time and place for the public hearing regarding motorized/power boating at Lodi Lake. Attached is a copy of the Council Communication with back-up materials prepared by the Parks and Recreation Director and distributed to the City Council in the agenda packet for the June 3 meeting. Per the City Council's direction, representatives of the various homeowner's associations along the Mokelumne River have been advised of this hearing. Two display advertisements calling attention to the hearing will also appear in the Lodi News-Sentinel.

Petitions signed by a number of citizens in opposition to power boat prohibition on the lake have been received and will be presented by the City Clerk.

SUBJECT: City Council set a public hearing to consider recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission regarding motorized boating on Lodi Lake.

PREPARED BY: Parks and Recreation Director

RECOMMENDED ACTION: That the City Council set a public hearing for June 17, 1987, to receive public input regarding motorized/power boating on Lodi Lake

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The Parks and Recreation Commission took under advisement the recommendations of the Lodi Lake Park Master Plan of 1975 (Exhibit A attached) and the current plan under development by Mr. Richard Bigler (Exhibit B attached) wherein both have recommended the elimination of motorized/power boating on Lodi Lake due to the size of the Lake, its liability during use, and its disruptive uses by motorized/power boats which restrict the use by any others wishing to put sailboats, canoes, or any other non-motorized crafts in the water. Additionally, it has been stated that use by motorized crafts have torn down and eroded the banks and required extensive repairs to same, i.e. cement retaining walls have been constructed to prevent further bank problems.


The Parks and Recreation Commission conducted two meetings to hear public concern over eliminating motorized power boating on the Lake, which were held on April 7 and May 5 during the course of the regular Commission meetings. Approximately 20 people were present at these two meetings, which had been set to explore and discuss the basic problems and receive input. Various legal questions were asked at these meetings, at which time Director Williamson was asked to secure answers to lake/river concerns and report back at the May meeting.

These questions were directed to City Attorney, Ron Stein, who was asked to attend the May meeting and answer any questions that might be raised as well as to bring the Commission up-to-date regarding access and liability responsibilities.

After much discussion and participation by the audience, the Commission moved that (1) all motorized power boating be eliminated from Lodi Lake, with the exception of sanctioned City of Lodi sponsored activities, rental boat recovery needs, and general park patrol functions; (2) that the launch or ramp be kept open for public access, for launching motorized power crafts, which will in turn be required to go directly into the river and exit likewise to recover craft; and (3) that there be a restriction on the types of motorized crafts that can be launched, those types being V-drives, inboards and jet boats, and all others would be approved to launch and have access to the river.

It should be noted that this recommendation was put together with assistance from citizens present and met with approval at its conclusion for presentation to the Council.

I might additionally bring to your attention the "Lodi Municipal Code" book of the general ordinance of the City and to Section 12: "Streets, sidewalks and public places" Page 203, 12.12.180 "Boating - Where Permitted" for review of the current ordinance covering boating in public places (Exhibit C attached.)

LODI LAKE MASTERPLAN, SUMMER 1986

BOATING:

The issue of boating is brought up in the 1975 Masterplan of the Lodi Lake. The recommendation is to discontinue power boating. No discussion exists other than to stop power boating.

Power boating, as it now exists should be discontinued. Not only is the present use life threatening, it is a miracle, no life or limb has been lost to date. The result of such a accident would result in a massive suit against the City.

Other negative factors of power boating are:

- a. Noise pollution of a residential area.
- b. Human powered boats, sail boats, surf craft and power boats do not mix. (photo record)
- c. Bank damage to the river. The main portion of the lake and some areas of the river are protected by a low wall. Many of the upper river areas have no protection and the power boating creates wakes that are breaking down the banks. Trees along the bank are being undermined and are falling into the river. (photo record)

The banks that fall into the river cause silting and filling of the river and foredam. In the discussion of the infrared discussion of the marsh, it is pointed out that further silting of the river and lake areas would cause the marsh to expand to a condition that would be unmanageable. The whole of the existing waterways could be choked with reeds. (photo record)

- E. The existing natural amenities lend themselves to a nature interpretation program which can be used in conjunction with the school system and can be offered to the general public on weekends and holidays during the high-use seasons of the year.
- F. The 13-acre area to the west of the existing park, because of its relative protection from flooding and its large, flat land area offers the opportunity for development of high intensity park uses such as group picnicking, informal games and sport fields and a large parking lot.
- G. Because of the extreme cost and physical difficulty in developing a total circulation system, several circulation alternatives should be considered including: perimeter road system, one-way perimeter road system, and elimination of automobiles and use of a tram system.
- H. The existing facilities at Lodi Lake Park should be studied and their functions combined into fewer new structures appropriately located to reduce congestion at the main entrance area, and provide improved service to the park users.
- I. Because of its relatively small size and configuration, power boating on Lodi Lake itself should be eliminated.

The project would initially involve development of Phase I and portions of Phase II as outlined in the Master Plan. (pg.2) Implementation of Phase I calls for development of the 58 acres northeast of the present park into a limited use Nature Study Area. This would be comprised of a paved bicycle, emergency/service access, and hiking trail around the perimeter of the 58 acres. There will be two paved access trails which cut across the nature area and tie in with the trail around the perimeter. These trails are necessary for emergency equipment access and fire protection. The fire hazard in this area has been a serious problem for years. In addition to the paved trail, there will be an unpaved nature trail through the area to allow for nature study tours by individuals and organized groups.

A water system will be installed in the area which will provide for fire protection and irrigation of the levee adjacent to the homes located along Edgewood Drive. Pig's Lake, the drainage ditch, and rainfall will provide much of the water necessary to plant and wildlife inhabiting the area.

Chemical toilets will be installed to service the nature study area, so that extension of a sewer line will not be necessary.

This area would be developed with minimal environmental impact to preserve its natural aspects, while allowing limited public recreation use.

The City plans to implement portions of Phase II in conjunction with development of the nature study area to help alleviate a deficiency in high intensity recreation use areas. This would entail removal of the grape vineyard from the 13-acre parcel west of the lake. The land would be graded and prepared for lawn seeding and some tree plantings. It would be irrigated and one of

12.12.150 Bathing, swimming and waterskiing—Where permitted.

No person in a park shall swim, bathe, wade, or water ski in any waters or waterways in or adjacent to any park, except in such waters and at such places as are provided therefor, and in compliance with such regulations as are set forth in this chapter or may be adopted, nor shall any person frequent any waters or places customarily designated for the purpose of swimming, bathing or waterskiing, or congregate thereat when such activity is prohibited by the director upon a finding that such use of the water would be dangerous or otherwise inadvisable. (Prior code § 15A-27)

12.12.160 Bathing, swimming and waterskiing—Hours.

No person in a park shall frequent any waters or places designated for the purpose of swimming or bathing, or congregate thereat, except between such hours of the day as are designated by the director for such purposes for each individual area. (Prior code § 15A-28)

12.12.170 Beach structures.

No person in a park shall erect, maintain, use or occupy on or in any beach or bathing area any tent, shelter or structure of any kind unless there is an unobstructed view into such tent, shelter or structure from at least two sides; nor shall any guy wire, rope or extension, or exterior brace or support, be connected or fastened from any such structure to any other structure, stake, rock or other object outside of the structure. (Prior code § 15A-29)

12.12.180 Boating—Where permitted.

No person in a park shall bring into or operate any boat, raft or other watercraft, whether motor-powered or not, upon any waters, except at places designated for boating by the director. Such activity shall be in accordance with applicable regulations as of the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter or may thereafter be adopted. (Prior code § 15A-30)

12.12.190 Boating—Safety.

No person in a park shall navigate, direct or handle any boat in such a manner as to unjustifiably or unnecessarily annoy or frighten or endanger the occupants of any other boat. (Prior code § 15A-31)

12.12.200 Boating—Hours.

No person in a park shall launch, dock or operate any boat of any kind on any waters between the closing hour of the park at night and opening hour the following morning, nor shall any person be on, or remain on or in any boat during the closed hours of the park. (Prior code § 15A-32)

12.12.210 Picnic areas—Use.

No person in a park shall picnic or lunch in a place other than those designated for that purpose. Attendants shall have the authority to regulate the activities in such areas when necessary to prevent congestion and to secure the maximum use for the comfort and convenience of all. Visitors shall comply with any directions given to achieve this end. (Prior code § 15A-33)

June 4, 1987





Chairman Devine opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as mailed on a motion by Dave Reese, seconded by Tad Ishihara.

Superintendent/Staff Reports: Field presented to the Commission the monthly report by Supervisor Mike Reese, which had not been included in the packet of information mailed to the Commissioners.

Field indicated that in spite of all of the rainouts and delays for the tryouts for the boys and girls baseball programs, they both seemed to be well underway, and all participants and coaches are hoping for a dry season.

Parks Superintendent Essin made a brief project updated report to the Commission and also briefly explained the status of the Department's computer request to the City. Currently, the Department is investigating various systems that could be installed in our Department so that we can really be on line, with the entire staff having hands-on access to various computer terminals.

Chairman Devine asked Director Williamson to review for the Commission the Information Items as follows:

1. Emerson Park - Rich Bigler, the Department's landscape architect, will design a Master Plan for Emerson Park, with particular attention given to relocating and/or expanding the Tot Lot playground equipment area. As soon as that is completed, the Lodi Lions Club is ready, willing, and financially able to assist in the installation of said equipment.
2. Westgate Park - The Lodi Rotary Club is prepared to spend a 2-weekend club work project to install playground equipment that has been purchased by their club in said park.
3. The feasibility study is in progress for "G" Basin.

(OVER)

4. Superintendent Field asked Supervisor Boomer to present an A.S.A. Tournament report. Boomer indicated the Tournament Committee has adopted a revised logo to be used to promote the tournament and to be placed on all official souvenirs for the tournament. Pins have been ordered in the shape of said logo and will be available as a promotional item shortly.
5. Director Williamson again thanked the Commission for their input in the joint City Council and Recreation and Parks Commission meeting in regard to the Lodi Lake Master Plan. Williamson indicated in his correspondence and discussions with Richard Bigler, architect of the Master Plan, that Bigler felt many valuable comments came out of the meeting, and hopefully, the Master Plan he presents to the Commission in May will address these specific items:
6. At this time Williamson requested Bob Morris of Morris and Wenell describe the preliminary plan for the corporation yard, Parks and Recreation Division offices, and master plan of the site now occupied by the Parks and Recreation Department. Morris indicated that the proposed plan calls for an 8' wall around the perimeter of the entire area, which would accomplish two purposes: 1) to shield from public view the equipment and materials stored in the area, and 2) hopefully, reduce vandalism. In designing the area based on a projected plan of size of the Department in 5, 10, or 20 years, Morris recommended to the Commission and staff that serious consideration be given to moving the Recreation full-time staff, including the Parks Superintendent, to Hutchins St. Square as he seems to feel there is not enough room for the staff's proposed expansion of the Parks Division with its varied and oftentimes large equipment and materials.
Commissioner Swanson inquired as to the feasibility of establishing one or more "satellite" locations around town to house and locate large mowers and/or scooters and other such equipment. Morris replied that he felt the "one corporation yard" concept seemed to be the most practical in that the mowers and other equipment are serviced and maintained on a daily basis; therefore, they should be returned to one location for this purpose. Morris felt that the current location of the Parks and Recreation yard is still very centrally located to the entire community as many of our largest facilities are located less than one mile from said location.
7. Morris was asked to continue his presentation with regard to the proposed design of a restroom facility for the north side of Lodi Lake Park. Morris stated that his firm attempted to retain the basic style of architecture that is currently present at Lodi Lake Park when designing the style of the proposed restroom facility. It would be of a slumpstone type exterior, with a red tile roof. Morris explained to the Commission that in a discussion with Williamson prior to this meeting he had received some recommendations for minor modifications to this proposed plan and proceeded to explain same to the Commission. A revised and final proposal will be presented to the Commission in May.

8. Blakely Park Pool Construction: Superintendent Essin informed the Commission that the remodeling of the existing pool, at Blakely Pool, has begun as of this date. Hopefully, no unforeseen items will delay the targeted deadline for completion of the remodeling set for June 15.
9. Armory Park Softball Complex Restroom Facilities: Superintendent Essin told the Commission the old restroom facility at Armory Park has been totally removed, and hopefully the new facility would be ready for use by June 1. Porto-Potties have been installed temporarily due to the fact the facility is being used for adult softball. The complex restroom remodeling will begin sometime around the first of June.
10. The proposed shade shelter structure for the softball complex is in the preliminary drawing stage.
11. Williamson has been meeting with the concessionaire of the Golf Driving Range at the Festival Grounds. The contract is due as of June 30. Details between the City and the operator are being worked out currently.
Williamson indicated he is also renegotiating the City/Grape and Wine Festival contract at the same time and will have a further report when both contracts are final.
12. A meeting has been scheduled for Recreation and Parks staff and the Lodi Unified School District to review and adopt the Joint Use Agreement between these two agencies.

Chairman Devine proceeded to the ACTION ITEMS as listed on the agenda.

1. Devine asked Director Dave Orozco to approach the Commission with his proposal on behalf of the Lodi Boys and Girls Club. Orozco at this time introduced his Board President, Clarence Turner, who in turn recapped the issue before the Commission with regard to the Lodi Boys and Girls Club asking for land to house their proposed permanent building for the Lodi Boys and Girls Club to include off-street parking. Turner indicated that the Board had revised their thinking on the suggestion by the Recreation and Parks Commission to not consider Hale Park as a potential site but instead look to Blakely Park. Turner asked the Commission to review the preliminary drawings that they had on display and to note that the suggested location of the proposed building and parking lot would be on the corner of Poplar and Washington Streets in Blakely Park.

At this time Director Dave Orozco reviewed a report that had been submitted to the Commission, explaining the census figures that he and his Board had compiled regarding this area as being a prime target area for their program on the east side of town. After a thorough discussion, the Commission requested that Staff take the preliminary plans back and come up with final recommendations to the Commission in May. Williamson explained that he had some concerns about the possibility of using the existing outdoor basketball facility that is now located in that general area of Blakely Park.

(OVER)

2. Chairman Devine asked Superintendent Field for the report on adult softball fees. Field asked that Steve Doomer present the report as he was the individual assigned to the job of compiling the information contained in the two documents submitted to the Commission.

Boomer indicated that six communities were surveyed and had been asked specifically to address the costs of player fees, sponsor fees, and if, in fact, any department assessed teams and/or players a small charge to be placed in an account that would be used to fund capital outlay projects for their softball facilities. Boomer indicated upon receiving the information from the communities and compiling same, he then had the Lodi Sports Advisory Board review the information, and the second document that he has submitted to the Commission contains their recommendations to the Commission and staff, one being that the Adult Advisory Board would survey the adult softball teams at the conclusion of this summer's season to investigate the following items:

- a. How do most teams feel about the City considering increasing the basic team fees and/or player fees?
- b. Do the teams feel the need for more than ten games in a summer season?
- c. Do the teams feel that the City, by raising umpires' salaries, could in fact provide the league with a better caliber of officiating?
- d. Would the Lodi teams endorse a proposal of being assessed an additional charge, which monies would then be placed in a reserve account for future capital projects?

At this time Williamson summarized for the Commission the basic reason for the report as these were some concerns that were voiced at an earlier Commission meeting by Bob Johnson.

At this time Bob Johnson was asked to approach the Commission. Johnson explained he felt the report still does not address the basic concern that he expressed in October to the Commission, which was, why in fact do the adults in the various sports programs not do something toward enhancing facilities or providing additional equipment to the programs such as what the B.O.B.S. organization does for the betterment of youth sports programs. Johnson indicated that currently the City is replacing the rest-room facilities at Armory Park and had recently replaced the fencing around Armory Park. He understands that these items are being underwritten totally by the Department's capital outlay program and City funds when, in fact, some of these costs should have or could have been borne by the adult participants in softball themselves.

Commissioner Swanson asked that Staff prepare for the May meeting a breakdown of adult softball with regard to how the sponsor fees and player fees relate to the actual cost of offering the activity on a per-game basis.

3. Chairman Devine and Director Williamson explained to the Commission that after individual discussions held with Ed DeBenedetti regarding naming a facility after him, it was determined that Ed feels very strongly toward the naming of "G" Basin (if it in fact becomes a golf course) after him, and that he would prefer not having a current facility renamed.
4. Chairman Devine indicated that the trailer fee, group picnic area reservation plan and fee structure would be tabled to the May meeting, that Superintendent Essin was somewhat overwhelmed with budget preparation and was unable to prepare a complete report at this time.
5. The final action item was the staff review of the proposed 1987-88 budget that has been prepared. Superintendent Essin read his letter of transmittal for the Commission's benefit as he felt it addressed the major concerns that the Department has.

Superintendent Field previously reviewed the Recreation Division budget and Director Williamson read the Letter of Transmittal. The total operating budget for the Recreation Division as proposed is \$531,15.00 and the Parks Division is \$1,049,762.00. Williamson indicated to the Commission that the Department also submits an \$8,000.00 Lodi Arts Commission budget, which in fact is prepared by the Arts Commission totally and we are just a means of housing said budget.

After a brief discussion, on a motion by Dennis Swanson, seconded by Tad Ishihara, the Commission unanimously approved the proposed budget.

Chairman Devine asked Director Williamson to address the NEW ITEM for discussion as listed on the agenda with regard to boating on Lodi Lake. Williamson indicated that as far back as 1972 with an environmental study that was done on Lodi Lake and a 1975 master plan as developed by the Department and including the current master plan being developed for Lodi Lake, there was a concensus of opinion that all power boating should be eliminated from Lodi Lake, and in effect, all three studies recommended that serious consideration be given to limiting power boating in the river, although all three studies recognized that the City and the Department have no jurisdiction over the river boating. Williamson quoted from Richard Bigler's Master Plan Summary study report and then opened up the item for public discussion.

Williamson told the Commission that when this item was brought before the City's Risk Management group the group felt that the City in fact could be liable for a boating accident occurring in the Mokelumne River by the fact that if the boat were launched via the public boat ramp now in Lodi Lake and the City knowing the hazards and condition of the river, we in fact contributed to the accident.

Commissioner Swanson asked who is responsible for the debris in the river along the property that is owned by the City. Williamson felt that the City could be held liable in that his interpretation is we, the City, in fact own to the middle of the river.

Adam Farrow approached the Commission, citing the following items:

1. The Army Corps of Engineers is responsible for cleaning up the river. To his knowledge, they have not in recent history done anything in the way of clean-up along the river.
2. If the horseshoe bend in the river adjacent to the north side and trailer area of Lodi Lake were posted with a 5-mile-an-hour speed limit, that would eliminate many of the accidents that are occurring in and adjacent to this particular area.
3. When boats enter and are on Lodi Lake, they should be instructed via signs and/or pamphlets handed to them when entering Lodi Lake that they must travel in a counter-clockwise rotation.
4. To increase safety when the City is operating their boat rental operation, a course should be marked with buoys on the lake, which would in fact separate the power boats from said rental crafts.
5. The majority of downed trees are above the '99 bridge. No one water skis on that stretch of river due to the amount of debris in the water; therefore, in effect Farrell is stating that the reports and information produced to the Commission indicating that water skiers and large power boats contribute to the amount of erosion and other negative aspects to the river is, in fact, false. The basic cause of erosion and destruction of the river and its banks is caused by the amount of water flow from Camanche and this is controlled by East Bay Municipal District.

Russ Munson, representing the Willow Glen property owners, asked the Commission to immediately remove the public boat launch contained in Lodi Lake and to cut off access to the river entirely from Lodi Lake. His Association feels that this would cut down to a great extent people entering the river who are unfamiliar with the river and its environs and would also solve the liability problems for the city. Munson indicated the property owners association feels that the power boating taking place on the river by association members and other individuals familiar with the river is not a negative situation.

Bob Johnson indicated he would not put his power boat in the river. He feels it is too dangerous, that the horsepower should be limited on the river in its entirety.

Buddy Cash indicated to the Commission that he is a long-time boater on the lake and in the river and that he feels the people who live in and around the river area adjacent to Lodi Lake are very concerned, responsible boaters and take the necessary precautions to use the river in the safe manner, but that the public that is allowed access to the river via the boat launch at Lodi Lake are the largest contributors to the problems that arise on the river.

Williamson, in summarizing the discussion, indicated that he will research the legal questions of what in fact the City and the Department can do and will report to the Commission in May.

(CONTINUED)

Tailgating on the boating question, Williamson asked the Commission as to their feelings of insisting and requiring that all users of rental craft on Lodi Lake must wear a lifejacket.

Kyle Roper, Park Ranger, indicated that he saw many problems in being able to enforce this rule. Superintendent Field stated that in order to make such a ruling meaningful, the Commission would have to determine what the reprimands would be for violators, how in fact would the rule be enforced, should there be a refund given on the rental, etc.

Williamson directed Superintendent Essin to canvas several near-by lake operations that are known to have city-operated boat rentals to determine what their existing policies are and if in fact they would recommend further rules and regulations.

Chairman Devine asked if there were any other items from the floor. Russ Munson asked Director Williamson what the status of the replacement and/or remodeling of the press box in the Grape Bowl was. Williamson explained that he had met with School District football coaches and athletic directors and several discussions had been held with regard to the desires of the coaches. Upon the costing out of what was desired and the City's contention that 90% of the use is made by the School District, it is felt that the School District should fund the major part of the project. The Committee had come back with a revised proposal of a basic one-story design that would cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000. Williamson also stated that the School District has come up with no means of funding the project, so everything is on hold.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

Meeting called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Chairman Devine. Director Williamson introduced to the Commission Dale Summersille, the Department's new Recreation Supervisor.

Chairman Devine asked if the commission members had any questions regarding the reports submitted by staff; no questions were asked. On a motion by Tad Ishihara, seconded by Dave Reese, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as mailed.

Chairman Devine asked Director Williamson to proceed through the information items as listed on the agenda.

- A. Westgate Park dedication was held, with playground equipment installed and dedicated. Commission expressed a heartfelt "thank you" to the Lodi Rotary Club for this community service project.
- B. Emerson Park -- The Department is currently working with the Lodi Lions Club to install playground equipment. Superintendent Essin will be presenting a plan for the location and installation of said equipment to the Commission.
- C. and D. Williamson informed the Commission that due to problems in obtaining information regarding phases of the Lodi Lake Master Plan and the feasibility study for "G" Basin, Landscape Architect Richard Bigler requested a postponement of these two items.
- E. No change in the Parks corporation yard and Recreation Dept. remodeling plans.
- F. No report on north side Lake Park restrooms.
- G. Blakely Park Pool Project -- Superintendent Essin submitted pictures of the existing pool deck and explained the contractor is concerned if this deck is not removed or resurfaced.

The Commission recommended that once staff has reached a decision on what should be done with the deck that a special meeting be called so that a recommendation can be made to the City Council.

- O. ASA National Tournament Update -- Superintendent Field indicated the tournament committee had decided on the logo to be used for the tournament and that pins have been ordered and will be sold as soon as they are received to announce the forthcoming event and will be on sale during the three days of the tournament. Field indicated that Bob Johnson has to date secured some \$9,500 in ad commitments for the tournament program and that the Committee is secure in fielding the \$15,000 obligation to A.S.A. will be met. Williamson indicated to the commission that any profits made by the tournament will be turned over to the B.O.B.S.

ACTION ITEMS

- A. The adult Softball Sports Fee Final Report -- Superintendent Field asked the commission to comment on the two reports submitted by staff. She asked the Commission to note that one report had been prepared to include mowing costs of the adult softball facilities whereas the identical report submitted did not include the mowing costs as staff felt these areas are park sites and would have to be mowed whether they were developed as softball diamonds or some other recreation use.

Dennis Swanson asked Bob Johnson how he felt about the report. Bob Johnson indicated the report addressed the questions that he had and the findings that the adult softball program was costing the City some \$100 per team was not surprising to him. He reiterated again the concerns that he continues to have with regard to the adult softball program as far as:

1. He feels the fees should be covering the costs of operating said program.
2. Because of the Department's 5-year capital program which lists some \$300,000 to \$500,000 being expended on improvements to said softball facilities, the City should in no way be underwriting the costs of adult softball.

After a discussion, on a motion by Dean Devine, seconded by Dennis Swanson, the Commission directed staff to submit the reports to the Adult Sports Board and ask the Board to recommend to the Commission what they feel would be ways and/or means of making the adult softball program self-supporting.

- B. Lodi Lake power boats and use of ramp for launching of power boats -- Director Williamson addressed specific questions to City Attorney Ron Stein so that the Commission and members of the audience would be clear on the City's legal liability with regard to the boating question in Lodi Lake and the adjacent river.

1. The City has no legal responsibility to provide a boat launch ramp to the river and/or Lodi Lake.
2. The City has no liability with regard to boats in the Mokelumne River.

on Lodi Lake, the only exceptions being when a sanctioned City event such as the 4th of July boat races are to be held.

2. On a motion by Dean Devine, seconded by Dennis Swanson, the Commission unanimously recommended that the City retain the boat launch and inform all users and sign the ramp to indicate power boats launched must enter the river.
3. On a motion by Dennis Swanson, seconded by Tad Ishihara, the Commission recommended that no V-drive, jet boats, or inboards be allowed to launch from the Lodi Lake launch ramp.

The final action item was the Department's rental craft/life jacket policy on Lodi Lake -- After a discussion and confirmation by City Attorney Ron Stein, the Department's policy of making it mandatory for youth under the age of 18 to wear a life jacket at all times when renting any City craft and to issue a life jacket to all adults who are using said craft will continue.

There being no other items to bring before the commission, the meeting was adjourned at 10 p.m.

Ron Williamson opened up the hearing with a brief history of the Department and the Commission's plans and proposals for the complete development of Lodi Lake Park.

Williamson then turned over the hearing to the landscape architect, Richard Bigler, who again presented a brief history of the Mokelumne River and Lodi Lake Park. Basic points covered by Bigler were:

1. The Mokelumne River has a tremendous amount of sediment (sand).
2. The river banks are rapidly eroding. Some steps need to be taken to minimize this situation.
3. Large oak trees growing alongside the river are having their root systems washed away due to the banks eroding. He feels a large amount of this erosion is being caused by the boats with waterskiiers running up and down the river.
4. Lodi Lake itself is filling with sand and sediment. One of the ways to minimize this condition is to close off the lake with an inlet and outlet pipe from there to the river, which would also control the lake and water level.

Bigler then asked the audience if he could address the 58-acre Wilderness Area as he felt this was the one segment to the total Lake Master Plan that would have the greatest controversy. Bigler emphasized that this 58-acres was one of the most pristine natural areas in northern California. One of the concerns that needs to be addressed immediately with regard to this area is that the area has lost most of its natural bird life. There are very few nests and very few birds living in the area. Bigler feels one of the main reasons is the numbers of cats that live and hunt in the area, the large dogs that are running through the area, and the intrusion of humans.

One of the best ways to maintain this area in its natural state is to control the access to the area. This can be done by fencing along the levee and placing a nature study building at the entrance to the property. The 58-acre Wilderness Area would be joined to

Lodi Lake Proper via a jogging/bicycle trail, which would continue around the circumference of Lodi Lake.

Addressing Lodi Lake Proper, Bigler indicated no major changes would take place other than modifying the existing parking areas to allow more parking in existing space and to redesign the entrance to Lodi Lake. Bigler recommended to the audience that the organized trailer group area, now located on the north side of Lodi Lake, be moved to the northwest portion of the undeveloped 13 acres and that in addition to moving the trailer area to the 13 acres, a large group picnic area or areas be developed adjacent to the recommended trailer site and to have a large turf area to be used for informal ballgames, volleyball, and other group type activities.

The following is a synopsis of concerns as voiced by members of the audience.

Dick Wilcox -- Lodi Lake should have motorized boats with no more than 5 h.p. engines. All other boats should be able to launch using the lake launch ramp but would have to immediately enter the river for any boating.

Donna Phillips -- Lodi Lake Park should not be designed and master-planned as a regional park. She feels there is not adequate enough acreage to call it a regional park and all designs and use of said facility should be for local residents only.

Paul Wood -- Leave Lodi Lake as it is, including the Wilderness Area. Any development of this project would increase property taxes and would encourage lots of out of town people to use the area. The Recreation and Parks Department should concentrate all of its efforts in cleaning up the river to make it safe for boating.

Vi and Bob Riggle -- We both walk the Wilderness Area all the time. We are diametrically opposed to any control over this area. The public should be allowed to use this area any time they desire and should not be encouraged to join a docent group or other organized tours.

Larry Simpferfer -- Keep away from any type of tour concept for using the Wilderness Area. He has talked to Audubon Society representatives and they feel the area is teeming with bird life.

Loren Wilson -- Recreation and Parks Department must check with Woodbridge Irrigation District prior to any plans or proposal with regard to the lake and its environs. Keep the Wilderness Area exactly as it is.

Donna Phillips -- Department has ignored the impact this facility poses on individuals who reside on Laurel Avenue. Residents adjacent to the park would appreciate any consideration that

can be given to minimizing the amount of traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian, that uses Laurel Avenue and the intrusion of people spilling over the park levee into their front yards.

After some two hours of discussion the public hearing was concluded with those in attendance agreeing on the following specific items:

1. Move the organized trailer area to the recommended location in the 13 acres.
2. Install a large group picnic area in the 13 acres.
3. Redo the main entrance to the park.
4. Construct a new concession stand and boat rental operation.
5. Redesign the south side parking areas.
6. Install a bicycle/jogging trail around the circumference of Lodi Lake connecting to a bicycle/jogging trail around the Wilderness Area.
7. Eliminate power boats from the lake entirely.
8. Provide safe access to Lodi Lake across Turner Road for pedestrians and vehicles. The group suggested stop signs and/or traffic signal.
9. Fence the Wilderness Area along the levee, providing access gates at the southeast and southwest ends of the acreage.

In conclusion Director Williamson indicated that Staff was working on a new fee proposal for organized trailer groups and that this recommendation would be submitted to the City Council for action in the near future.

SUBJECT: City Council set a public hearing to consider recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission regarding motorized boating on Lodi Lake.

PREPARED BY: Parks and Recreation Director

RECOMMENDED ACTION: That the City Council set a public hearing for June 17, 1987, to receive public input regarding motorized/power boating on Lodi Lake

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The Parks and Recreation Commission took under advisement the recommendations of the Lodi Lake Park Master Plan of 1975 (Exhibit A attached) and the current plan under development by Mr. Richard Bigler (Exhibit B attached) wherein both have recommended the elimination of motorized/power boating on Lodi Lake due to the size of the Lake, its liability during use, and its disruptive uses by motorized/power boats which restrict the use by any others wishing to put sailboats, canoes, or any other non-motorized crafts in the water. Additionally, it has been stated that use by motorized crafts have torn down and eroded the banks and required extensive repairs to same, i.e. cement retaining walls have been constructed to prevent further bank problems.

The Parks and Recreation Commission conducted two meetings to hear public concern over eliminating motorized power boating on the Lake, which were held on April 7 and May 5 during the course of the regular Commission meetings. Approximately 20 people were present at these two meetings, which had been set to explore and discuss the basic problems and receive input. Various legal questions were asked at these meetings, at which time Director Williamson was asked to secure answers to lake/river concerns and report back at the May meeting.

These questions were directed to City Attorney, Ron Stein, who was asked to attend the May meeting and answer any questions that might be raised as well as to bring the Commission up-to-date regarding access and liability responsibilities.

After much discussion and participation by the audience, the Commission moved that (1) all motorized power boating be eliminated from Lodi Lake, with the exception of sanctioned City of Lodi sponsored activities, rental boat recovery needs, and general park patrol functions; (2) that the launch or ramp be kept open for public access, for launching motorized power crafts, which will in turn be required to go directly into the river and exit likewise to recover craft; and (3) that there be a restriction on the types of motorized crafts that can be launched, those types being V-drives, inboards and jet boats, and all others would be approved to launch and have access to the river.

It should be noted that this recommendation was put together with assistance from citizens present and met with approval at its conclusion for presentation to the Council.

I might additionally bring to your attention the "Lodi Municipal Code" book of the general ordinance of the City and to Section 12: "Streets, sidewalks and public places" Page 203, 12.12.180 "Boating - Where Permitted" for review of the current ordinance covering boating in public places (Exhibit C attached.)

EXHIBIT A

LODI LAKE MASTERPLAN, SUMMER 1986

BOATING:

The issue of boating is brought up in the 1975 Masterplan of the Lodi Lake. The recommendation is to discontinue power boating. No discussion exists other than to stop power boating.

Power boating, as it now exists should be discontinued. Not only is the present use life threatening, it is a miracle, no life or limb has been lost to date. The result of such an accident would result in a massive suit against the City.

Other negative factors of power boating are:

- a. Noise pollution of a residential area.
- b. Human powered boats, sail boats, surf craft and power boats

do not mix. (photo record)

- c. Bank damage to the river. The main portion of the lake and some areas of the river are protected by a low wall. Many of the upper river areas have no protection and the power boating creates wakes that are breaking down the banks. Trees along the bank are being undermined and are falling into the river. (photo record)

The banks that fall into the river cause silting and filling of the river and foredam. In the discussion of the infrared discussion of the marsh, it is pointed out that further silting of the river and lake areas would cause the marsh to expand to a condition that would be unmanageable. The whole of the existing waterways could be choked with reeds. (photo record)

- E. The existing natural amenities lend themselves to a nature interpretation program which can be used in conjunction with the school system and can be offered to the general public on weekends and holidays during the high-use seasons of the year.
- F. The 13-acre area to the west of the existing park, because of its relative protection from flooding and its large, flat land area offers the opportunity for development of high intensity park uses such as group picnicking, informal games and sport fields and a large parking lot.
- G. Because of the extreme cost and physical difficulty in developing a total circulation system, several circulation alternatives should be considered including: perimeter road system, one-way perimeter road system, and elimination of automobiles and use of a tram system.
- H. The existing facilities at Lodi Lake Park should be studied and their functions combined into fewer new structures appropriately located to reduce congestion at the main entrance area, and provide improved service to the park users.
- I. Because of its relatively small size and configuration, power boating on Lodi Lake itself should be eliminated.

The project would initially involve development of Phase I and portions of Phase II as outlined in the Master Plan. (pg.2) Implementation of Phase I calls for development of the 58 acres northeast of the present park into a limited use Nature Study Area. This would be comprised of a paved bicycle, emergency/service access, and hiking trail around the perimeter of the 58 acres. There will be two paved access trails which cut across the nature area and tie in with the trail around the perimeter. These trails are necessary for emergency equipment access and fire protection. The fire hazard in this area has been a serious problem for years. In addition to the paved trail, there will be an unpaved nature trail through the area to allow for nature study tours by individuals and organized groups.

A water system will be installed in the area which will provide for fire protection and irrigation of the levee adjacent to the homes located along Edgewood Drive. Pig's Lake, the drainage ditch, and rainfall will provide much of the water necessary to plant and wildlife inhabiting the area.

Chemical toilets will be installed to service the nature study area, so that extension of a sewer line will not be necessary.

This area would be developed with minimal environmental impact to preserve its natural aspects, while allowing limited public recreation use.

The City plans to implement portions of Phase II in conjunction with development of the nature study area to help alleviate a deficiency in high intensity recreation use areas. This would entail removal of the grape vineyard from the 13-acre parcel west of the lake. The land would be graded and prepared for lawn seeding and some tree plantings. It would be irrigated and one of

12.12.150 Bathing, swimming and waterskiing—Where permitted.

No person in a park shall swim, bathe, wade, or water ski in any waters or waterways in or adjacent to any park, except in such waters and at such places as are provided therefor, and in compliance with such regulations as are set forth in this chapter or may be adopted, nor shall any person frequent any waters or places customarily designated for the purpose of swimming, bathing or waterskiing, or congregate thereat when such activity is prohibited by the director upon a finding that such use of the water would be dangerous or otherwise inadvisable. (Prior code § 15A-27)

12.12.160 Bathing, swimming and waterskiing—Hours.

No person in a park shall frequent any waters or places designated for the purpose of swimming or bathing, or congregate thereat, except between such hours of the day as are designated by the director for such purposes for each individual area. (Prior code § 15A-28)

12.12.170 Beach structures.

No person in a park shall erect, maintain, use or occupy on or in any beach or bathing area any tent, shelter or structure of any kind unless there is an unobstructed view into such tent, shelter or structure from at least two sides; nor shall any guy wire, rope or extension, or exterior brace or support, be connected or fastened from any such structure to any other structure, stake, rock or other object outside of the structure. (Prior code § 15A-29)

12.12.180 Boating—Where permitted.

No person in a park shall bring into or operate any boat, raft or other watercraft, whether motor-powered or not, upon any waters, except at places designated for boating by the director. Such activity shall be in accordance with applicable regulations as of the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter or may thereafter be adopted. (Prior code § 15A-30)

12.12.190 Boating—Safety.

No person in a park shall navigate, direct or handle any boat in such a manner as to unjustifiably or unnecessarily annoy or frighten or endanger the occupants of any other boat. (Prior code § 15A-31)

12.12.200 Boating—Hours.

No person in a park shall launch, dock or operate any boat of any kind on any waters between the closing hour of the park at night and opening hour the following morning, nor shall any person be on, or remain on or in any boat during the closed hours of the park. (Prior code § 15A-32)

12.12.210 Picnic areas—Use.

No person in a park shall picnic or lunch in a place other than those designated for that purpose. Attendants shall have the authority to regulate the activities in such areas when necessary to prevent congestion and to secure the maximum use for the comfort and convenience of all. Visitors shall comply with any directions given to achieve this end. (Prior code § 15A-33)
